Dear Governor Haslam:

Recent news reports have made us aware that Commissioner Raquel Hatter will soon resign from the administration. Her resignation will leave your 20+ cabinet with only one commissioner who is not white and none who are African American. This gives us great concern.

If something doesn't change, your cabinet is in danger of being the first cabinet to have zero African Americans in recent memory. We have asked members of the Shelby County Delegation to look into the matter on our behalf. According to their preliminary research, your predecessor, Governor Bredesen had at least three African Americans during his last two years in office—Commissioners Gwendolyn Davis, Deborah Story, and John Keys. Before that, Governor Sundquist had at least two African Americans during his last two years in office—Commissioners Natasha Metcalf and Donal Campbell.

We believe these leadership opportunities should be available to all. We know the Tennessee Black Caucus, the Nashville NAACP, and the Senate Minority Leader Lee Harris have already reached out to you on this matter. <u>We believe, like they do, that it is not possible that you have the best talent available, if you have no African Americans in your cabinet.</u>

If necessary, the Memphis NAACP will assist you in identifying top talent. Please respond if you should need our help. Thank you for considering our request.
